2. EXAMINATION RESULTS 2018-19

Ysgol Bro Gwaun celebrated a successful set of GCSE results this year, with the school achieving notable performances in many subject areas and with the majority of pupils achieving above expected outcomes across a broad range of qualifications.

The Welsh Government introduced a suite of new performance measures in 2019 which will provide a broader measure of performance across all subject areas and include all GCSE grade-point outcomes. From 2019 school performance is judged on:

Capped 9 points score (English, Maths, Science plus 6 best other GCSE equivalent scores);

Literacy score;

Numeracy score;

Science score;

Skills Cymru Challenge (SCC) score.

These replace the L2+, L1 and L2 indicators as key performance judgements.

The scores are calculated by converting GCSE grades to a numerical value, where:

A* - 58 points

A - 52 points

B - 46 points

C-40 points

D - 34 points

E - 28 points

F – 22 points

G - 16 points

U - 0 points

In 2019 the school achieved:

Capped 9 points – 370 points Literacy – 37 points Numeracy – 39 points Science – 39 points SCC – 43 points.

Analysis shows that the school performed above the all Wales average score in the Capped 9, Numeracy, Science and SCC measures. The performance of the literacy measure was slightly below the Wales average.

4.3 Community Links

Rotary Young Chef Competition

In January, JJ Butcher, Year 9, Rebecca Hall and Christopher Harries, Year 10, represented the school at the Rotary Young Chef Competition, which was held at Ysgol Penrhyn Dewi. The competition was judged by professionals from the catering and restaurant sector. Entries were judged according to technique, creativity and visual appeal, taste, overall impact and plating, along with observation of excellent hygiene. The standard of competition was extremely high, with Rebecca securing second place. Rebecca represented the school at county level on 4th February at Pembrokeshire College, and was highly commended for her efforts in the competition, despite having to compete in an unfamiliar setting.

Well done to all that took part in the competition.

Technology Tournament

In March, a group of Key Stage 3 pupils took part in a Technology Tournament held at Pembrokeshire College. The event, which was organised by the Rotary Club, saw pupils working in small groups to create a solution to an engineering problem. Pupils were given the opportunity to develop many new and existing skills. The school thank the Rotary Club for their hard work in organizing the day, and look forward to attending the event next year.



Rotary Writing Competition

In the Spring Term, during English lessons, KS3 pupils took part in the Young Writers Competition. The Young Writers Competition is a well-established and successful competition promoted by Rotary International in Britain. The competition aims to encourage young people to develop their writing skills and to write with imagination and creativity. The task this year was to produce a written piece entitled, 'My Inspiration'. The written entry could be fiction or non-fiction, a story or a poem, as long as the piece related to the theme.

Pupils wrote about famous people they admired, family members who inspired them, some wrote about the beautiful landscapes that they drew inspiration from, whilst other pupils created stories that included moral messages of inspiration. As always, the standard of writing was incredibly high, with some emotional, detailed and creative pieces being produced. The winning entries were decided upon by the English department and then submitted to the Rotary Club for judging.

Aled James and Courtney Waugh, both from Year 9 were successfully awarded second and third place. Both pupils worked hard to produce poignant pieces, and were well-deserved of the certificates they were presented with.

7 KS2/3Transition Links

The Family of Schools met on three occasions during the year.

The Family of Schools continued to work alongside Ysgol Bro Gwaun staff on crossphase meetings, with an emphasis on Literacy and the New Curriculum.

The focus of Moderation was on English, Welsh, Science and Maths, and the Family of Schools worked closely together on several occasions to produce pupil portfolios.

In November, the annual Open Evening was very well attended by pupils and parents of Years 4-6.

A number of Transition Days took place, which included a Year 6 Health & Wellbeing Day Year 4, 5 and 6 Music and Day with concert, Year 5 Science and Technology Day, Year 6 Harbwr Transition Days, Year 6 Expressive Arts Day, Year 6 Technology Day, Year 6 Humanities Day and a Various Activities Day, in addition to the Annual Year 4, 5 & 6 Open Evening, and a 'Cows on Tour agricultural event'.

Miss Rhian Lewis, Miss Alana Finn, Ms Emma Bowen and Mr Paul Edwards visited Primary schools during the Summer Term, with a view to liaise with staff, and meet with prospective pupils.

The Bwrlwm project was a great success again this year, where pupils from Primary schools were invited to broaden and improve further their Welsh language skills. Bwrlwm Bach was a success again, where pupils were given the opportunity to attend Ysgol Bro Gwaun to up-skill in key words in Music, PE and PSE, through the medium of Welsh. 7.1 Main aspects of work undertaken by the Language Unit during the Educational Year 2018-19 – Mrs Eiry Bellis

Within the Unit -

- teaching Welsh to KS2 latecomers from within the family of schools two days a week
- teaching KS2 'follow on'/intermediate learners –one day a week.
- running Radio Bwrlwm Bro Gwaun club to help secondary pupils (1st language & learners) to use their language skills socially and create radio programmes.
- preparing learning resources, translating and liasing with staff of Welsh Department.
- arrange bridging days through the medium of Welsh for Year 6 pupils who plan on attending Ysgol Bro Gwaun (last half term before Summer).

Initial Teacher Training and NQT induction Initial Teacher Training (ITT)

In 2018-19, Ysgol Bro Gwaun welcomed five PGCE students to undertake their School Experience 1- one ICT student from Aberystwyth University, alongside four students from the Athrofa, Trinity St. David's in English, Mathematics, Religious Studies and Biology. A further English student was placed at Ysgol Bro Gwaun as part of the new Athrofa, Trinity St. David's elective experience in the summer term, a professional development opportunity for students to spend 8 days in a school, gathering an understanding of an area, subject or theme of interest, by means of observation, professional dialogue, research and data collection. The theme chosen by the student teacher included literacy skills of eFSM pupils.

Of the five student teachers, three continued successfully into their second

placements, 1 returned to a previous successfully held post as a Learning Support Assistant and 1 returned to their career of an accountant. The student teacher on elective experience successfully gained full-time employment in Carmarthenshire.

During the school year, our pupils have enjoyed a variety of extra-curricular activities. The highlight of the Autumn Term included the highly successful school production of 'Annie', and the annual School & Community Carol Service held at St. Mary's Church in Fishguard.

The Certificate Evening was held during the Spring Term celebrating the successes of our pupils. Ysgol Bro Gwaun also accommodated the successful 'Cows on Tour' event in May which was enjoyed by over 900 Primary School pupils.

At the end of the Summer Term, replacing the annual end of year reward trips and visits, a very successful 'Gwaun Fest' was held at the school, which was enjoyed by 96% of the pupils.

The Alternative Curriculum and the Harbwr provision for pupils with complex needs have been instrumental in engaging vulnerable pupils, and improving attendance and self-esteem of targeted pupils. The school continues to provide the pupils with a stimulating and relevant curriculum with a key focus on listening to learners.

There have been several visits from the feeder schools and several visits by Bro Gwaun staff to them. The successful Bwrlwm and Bwrlwm Bach project continues to be an effective provision.

GCSE Geography Fieldwork trip

Grand Theatre Trip

In September, 100 Year 9, 10 and 11 pupils travelled to Swansea to watch the touring production of 'Blood Brothers' in the Grand Theatre. Year 9 studied the play in Music and Drama lessons during the Autumn Term, and the GCSE Music and Drama students had the opportunity to experience live theatre, a requirement of their courses. As always, the pupils were a credit to the school, and a good time was had by all!

Bwrlwm Bro Gwaun Radio Station

In September, a radio workshop with Bwrlwm Year 8 class was held at Canolfan Iaith Bro Gwaun. Mr Marc Griffiths, well-known in the media and radio, came to host the workshop.

Marc is responsible for establishing Cymru.FM, a radio channel that runs online and the programs are broadcast globally. He also has his own radio program on Radio

Cymru every Saturday evening. During the day, pupils had the opportunity to script, record and produce their first program on the theme "Famous Welsh People". This was a fantastic opportunity for them to learn how to plan and run their own radio station.

This was the launch of Radio Bwrlwm Bro Gwaun, and the first program was broadcast live on 26th September. The program was heard on Cymru.FM and on the Canolfan laith Bro Gwaun website https://www.canolfaniaithbrogwaun.com/radio-bwrlwm-bro-gwaun.html

Ysgol Bro Gwaun has a new building set for the Twenty First Century and the children's long-term vision is to stimulate and promote Welsh and Welshness. Through creating and establishing a radio station, which was broadcasted in the new building, the community and heard on a world-wide ptatform, the year 8 pupils' vision was set in stone and they are now ready to embark on an exciting adventure.

Bro Gwaun pupils have their political voices heard

In October, Year 9 pupils took part in a political education project, namely 'Our voices heard'. The purpose of the project, run through the electoral reform society and coproduction Wales, backed by the Education Secretary, was to hear what pupils want to learn about politics. The exciting project ran throughout Wales and targets pupils who will be the first to vote at the age of 16. Bro Gwaun pupils presented themselves spectacularly with presenters commenting on pupils high standards of behaviour, understanding and enthusiasm. Matt Mathias, Campaigns and Projects Officer for ERS Cymru, as well as ex-pupil stated 'We could not have been happier with the group, and I could not have been prouder of my old school'.



YBG pupils Aspire 2Be Future STEM Leaders

In October, a team of five Year 8 pupils participated in the Aspire 2Be Future STEM leaders' initiative. This incredible experience focused on providing opportunity for girls to recognize future possible careers in Engineering, through a successful collaboration between Coleg Sir Gar and Valero. The sessions involved using drones, 3D printing, virtual welding, robotics challenges, STEM experiments and pipe – line engineering construction. Good communication, confident team work and careful following of instructions were all essential skills demonstrated. Pupils also gained inspiration from ex-pupil Nancy John who facilitated the activities and is currently undertaking a Masters in Chemical Engineering, having gained a scholarship through Valero. Huge congratulations to Lara Van Soest, a member of the second place drone team, and Gwenna Maycock, receiving third place. Lauren John and Alexa Horne also gave noteworthy contributions, all girls representing the school admirably.





Sir Arthur Clarke Award

Congratulations to Head of Science & Technology, Mr Robert Woodman on the receipt of his Sir Arthur Clarke Award. As a member of the Space Ambassador program run by the European and UK Space Agencies, Robert has be recognised for his outstanding contribution to Space Science Education.

Bro Gwaun pupils 'Restart a Heart'

In October, to mark the world-wide 'Restart a Heart Day, Year 9 pupils and members of the School Council participated in CPR training. The purpose of the day being to train as many people as possible to react to a life or death situation of cardiac arrest. With every minute that passes before CPR is started, a person's chance of survival dramatically decreases. One in five will witness cardiac arrest, with a UK survival rate of one in ten. Pupils showed great maturity, enthusiasm and determination to perfect the technique. Needless to say, we are very proud of our potential lifesavers. Many thanks to the support given by Mr Rhys Thomas, local paramedic, who volunteered to facilitate the training.



Engineering Team Challenge

In November, 6 Year 9 pupils participated in the Institution of Civil Engineers Wales Cymru civil engineering activity at Pembrokeshire College. This event supported the school's STEM programme and helped with the choosing of GCSE subjects.

Ysgol Bro Gwaun Scholars Programme

In November, twelve Year 9 and 10 pupils visited Bristol University as part of the launch trip on the Scholars programme. They have made a positive start to an eightweek commitment which aims to provide insight and challenge to work at a level of work displayed at university. Being able to complete the task will provide pupils with confidence in their ability and will also aid university applications, giving them a unique edge over other applicants.

The Scholars Programme recruits PhD researchers, trains them as university access professionals and places them as tutors in schools to deliver programmes of university style tutorials to small groups of high potential pupils. Pupils study academic subjects based on their PhD tutor's research, completing weekly homework assignments and a final written assignment. The programme finished with an assignment submission, and trip to another partner university. Pupils had a campus tour, meet undergraduates and received guidance from university admissions staff. We looked forward to a celebratory graduation trip where the pupils gained recognition of their hard work and determination to succeed in this challenging, yet inspiring project.




Shakespeare for Schools Performance

This date saw the finale of a fantastic opportunity for twelve pupils who undertook the challenging task of attending university style lectures, developing new skills and gaining an advanced subject knowledge through completing a taxing, yet rewarding STEM assignment, at a full key stage above their current working level.

Suffice to say that Aled James, Daniel Cleary, Amelia Cox, Nancy Mason Hoskins, Xaria Davies and Huw Davies from Year 9, as well Alonwy Roberts, Maddy Stott, Ben Tannahill, Libby Rands, Archie Howell and Toby Colley from Year 10, fully embraced the experience concluding with them achieving outstanding results. This amazing opportunity began with a launch trip to Bristol University. Pupils made a positive start to an eight-week commitment, which aimed to provide insight and challenge, broadening their knowledge beyond the curriculum restrictions. The task providing pupils with opportunity to demonstrate confidence in their ability, aiding university applications of the future, by giving a unique edge over other applicants. Under the guidance of a PhD tutor. Dr Allison Zwarycz, Ysgol Bro Gwaun pupils worked on a project titled 'The microbial Hunger Games - eat or be eaten'. This was to be a study of two bacteria and their predatory interactions, namely *Bdellovibrio* bacteriovorus and Vibrio cholerae. They achieved incredibly well, all gaining university style gradings on their final assignments. The celebratory graduation trip to Oxford University saw the final stage of the programme where the impressive efforts of pupils gained full recognition with Alonwy and Nancy confidently presenting their findings to the graduation audience. As a school, we are immensely proud of the attitude, determination, resilience and commitment shown by these pupils.





Year 10 Maths Challenge

In February, a four Year 10 Mathematicians attended a countywide SEREN event, which aimed to promote and encourage young people to pursue Mathematics at Higher Education. Held in Haverfordwest High, teams from each of the secondary schools in Pembrokeshire were set a series of mathematical problems to solve. These challenging problems were created by Aberystwyth University and the FMSP (Further Maths Support Programme). Although the challenges were tough, the essence of the event was to emphasise the importance of problem solving and breaking complex tasks down into smaller, achievable pieces. The Bro Gwaun team consisting of Joss Lerwill, Zoe Latrobe, Ella Merritt and Maddy Stott all performed excellently, despite some initial nerves! They worked fantastically as a team, and answered all the questions posed to them, even when they were put on the spot! Overall, it was a successful event with the YBG team doing the school proud.

GCSE Art Workshop - Oriel y Parc

In February, a group of fifteen Year 10 Art students took part in an inspiring painting and drawing workshop led by renowned Cuban/Pembrokeshire artist Raul Speek at Oriel Y Parc Gallery in St Davids.

Raul gave a guided tour of his exhibition, and pupils engaged in various discussions about his work and the social issues that triggered his creative responses. The emphasis of the workshop was to recognise the importance of individuality (how essential it is to be ourselves, to stand firm in who we are and what we believe rather than just following the crowd). They talked about how social media can have both a positive and negative effect on our creativity, how essential it is for us to be able to think for ourselves and how future employers will be looking to recruit creative thinkers who can think independently and out of the box.

Pupils were encouraged to make bold, confident and expressive marks, shapes and textures onto large sheets of paper, Raul demonstrated one of his painting techniques, and the pupils then added blocks of colour to complete their unique and original mixed media pieces. Pupils felt very proud of the work they had produced, and are looking forward to experimenting with these techniques further back in the classroom.





YBG Show Racism The Red Card

As part of the PSE programme, Year 8 considered the topic of racism. 'Show Racism the Red Card' is the UK's anti-racism educational charity. The organisation utilises the high-profile status of football and football players to help tackle racism in society. Show Racism the Red Card Competitions encourage young people from schools and other educational settings to produce creative work with an original anti-racism theme. The school entries for the competition were judged and were sent on to compete on a national level. Seren Llwybr Music & Drama Workshop

In March, 3 pupils from Year 9 attended a Seren Llwybr Music & Drama Workshop at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama in Cardiff. The day started with a workshop from a Jazz musician. After lunch, pupils took part in two Drama workshops from lectures at the University. The practical workshops were undertaken with pupils from others schools from across Pembrokeshire and Carmarthenshire. The exciting day ended by a visit to the Sherman Theatre, where pupils watched an incredible performance of the musical 'Company' performed by the Post Graduate students of the Musical Theatre Course at the college.







<u>Creative Schools Project – Carew Cheriton Control Tower</u>

Year 8 pupils returned to Carew Cheriton Control Tower in April to film the final culmination of their Creative Schools project. Pupils had been working hard for 9 weeks learning about the important role that Maths played in the Battle of the Atlantic. Pupils were split into 4 groups, taking on the roles of Coastal Command, the Ministry of Signals, the Ministry of Supply and the Ministry of Transport. Each group were tasked with developing a challenge set in the context of World War 2, for example deciphering ciphers, using Morse code, and working out the fuel needed to safely return convoys to home. Pupils were filmed recording their challenges, as well as solving them, so that the clips can be used in future lessons with subsequent year groups.

All pupils thoroughly enjoyed filming their mathematical puzzles, dressed up in full regalia, whilst others also enjoyed the roles of studio and script managers. Fantastic assistance was given from the wonderful volunteers at Carew Cheriton Control Tower, as well as the Creative Practitioners involved in the project. A wonderful Battle of the Atlantic experience which proved how Maths really did win the war!









Democracy Training Event

In April, four pupils attended a Democracy training event hosted by the Children and Young People's Rights Office and Pembrokeshire Electoral Services. Zoe LaTrobe, Leon Delaney, Mefin Hughes and Chris Harries all representing the school superbly through contributing their views on Votes@16 being researched in conjunction with the National Assembly for Wales. Pupils gained valuable insight into the process of registration, the procedures within polling stations, contributed to discussions on the importance of the vote, and provided valuable input into the next steps in becoming future Democracy Champions.

The aim of the event was to provide students with an interactive insight into the vast

range of career opportunities available, as well as raising awareness of the pathways that can be taken. There were over 150 exhibitors present. As a school, we were allocated a 90-minute time slot, where pupils were able to walk around and talk to the exhibitors.

It was a successful day, with pupils saying they had an opportunity to talk to someone who had the knowledge about a future career they were thinking about, which helped them make a decision as whether this was a path they wished to follow. Others said they spoke to people about careers they hadn't thought about, and have changed their future plans.

Lego Mind-storm Workshop

In the afternoon, pupils took part in sport activities for the inclusion of pupils with disabilities and received certificates from Mrs Angela Miles – Disability Sports Wales Development Officer. The day gave the pupils a better understanding of the benefits for maintaining good well-being for all people in the community.

Cheese Factory and Chcolate Factory visits

Whilst having a demonstration, they had a peek into the factory and watched the chocolatiers in action, learning the history of chocolate and understanding of how it is made.

Llwybr Seren – Year 9 MAT Chemistry trip

In June, 6 Year 9 MAT pupils had an exciting visit to Swansea University to take part in workshops with Professor Simon Bott, Head of Chemistry. During the workshops, pupils worked with post-graduate students to make testers and carry out a pH titration. Later, pupils had a tour of the campus and a presentation on what it's like to study at a university. All pupils and staff had a great day.



Trio-Sci STEM Day

In June, Year 7 pupils were involved in a Trio-Sci Cymru STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) day.

Researchers and outreach officers from Aberystwyth University held a series of Science activities to assess the impact of STEM on pupil ideas about careers in STEM. The pupils conducted activities on shore and rock pool habitats, parasites, the Solar System using Virtual Reality and Exoplanets. Many had the opportunity to observe the night sky inside a planetarium.

This was the first of 3 taster sessions run by Aberystwyth University aimed at improving pupil perceptions of careers in STEM.







Food Technology educational trip

In June, 12 Year 10 pupils travelled to Pembrokeshire College for a taster day of 'Food Science and Nutrition with Diploma in Applied Science'.

'Forest School'

During June and July, Harbwr pupils were offered the opportunity of taking part in 'Forest School' for 6 weeks. Forest School uses the outdoor environment to enhance learning and development. Pupils experienced new challenges by learning how to look after themselves and each other as they gained new experiences and skills.

Year 10 MAT Maths Conference

In July, 14 Year 10 pupils attended a MAT Maths Conference run by The Further Mathematics Support Programme Wales at Pembrokeshire College. Pupils took part in a series of workshops on fun and challenging mathematics topics.

Year 10 Post-16 Transition workshops

In July, as part of ongoing post-16 education, Year 10 pupils travelled to Pembrokeshire College and the ALC for an initial introduction, tour and campus familiarisation activities day. It was an exciting first opportunity for pupils to see the facilities and the range of courses on offer. Pupils had an opportunity to take part in workshops such as Bricklaying, Electrical Installations, Sport, Hairdressing, Beauty, Plumbing, Catering, Health & Social Care, Complimentary Therapies, as well as a range of A Level courses.

'Year 8 Ice cream Challenge'

In July, 10 Year 8 pupils took part in an 'Ice Cream Challenge' against Ysgol Penrhyn Dewi at Pembrokeshire College. A four-day intense programme involved creativity, science and teamwork.

Ysgol Bro Gwaun and Ysgol Penrhyn Dewi each had two teams of five pupils, all teams were given a brief to design an innovative ice cream with a unique selling point, and the successful team's flavour was on sale at the County Show in August on the Lochmeyler ice cream stand.

All pupils had the opportunity to contribute to the design process, having had interesting talks from meat promotion Wales, Cardiff University, a food technology graduate, a graphic design specialist and a successful local ice cream producer. They were involved in the production of their group flavour, in addition to packaging design, and final ideas for marketing the product.

The YBG teams consisted of 'Cows go Moo' – Gwenna Maycock, Dewi Roberts, Alexa Horne, Emily Wakely and Catrin Morris, and, 'Dessertalicious' – Evan Curtis, Tyler Abbot-Deacon, Aliya Westrip, Lara Van Soest and Abigail Lewis.

Competition was fierce, with YBG's 'Cows go Moo' being the overall winners, followed by YBG's 'Dessertalicious' in second place. Special prizes were awarded to Gwenna Maycock for best team leader, Tyler Abbot-Deacon for best team player, and 'Dessertalicious' for the best packaging. A fantastic result for Ysgol Bro Gwaun!

All staff and pupils thoroughly enjoyed the challenge, and are looking forward to next year's event with the new Year 8 intake.



ALN work experience

Pupils from Year 9 Harbwr attended work experience at the Café in Letterston, where they had experience in working with the public, waitressing and general cleaning. They gained many skills during this time in addition to building their confidence.

Grassland Event

In June, twenty-five pupils from Years 7 to 10 attended the Royal Welsh Show Grassland event on a 180-acre site at Cardeeth Farm, Carew. As Pembrokeshire was the host county for the Show, the event gave pupils a unique opportunity to attend the Grassland event in the local area. Pupils observed all of the latest machinery and farming technology being demonstrated from the country's leading brands, including John Deere, JCB and Krone. They were also able to speak to some of the leading local and national agricultural engineers about the uses of the technology and future developments, including driverless tractors! The event was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended.



Link Days at Pembrokeshire College

In June, a number of Year 11 pupils attended a Link Programme at Pembrokeshire College. The programme was designed to help pupils to get to know what it is like studying at the College and to meet their tutors. Activities included Drama, Sport, Dance, IT, Literacy and Numeracy, as well as a tour of the College.

ALN Theatr Mwldan visit

In June, pupils attended an ASC friendly screening of 'Secret Life of Pets 2' at Theatr Mwldan, as part of extension tasks completed in class.

Geography Fieldwork trip

In June, 17 GCSE Geography students took part in a physical fieldwork investigation exercise. The group completed an investigation into downstream changes along the 'Afon Syfynwy', in and around the Rosebush area.

Whilst in July, 17 Year 10 GCSE Geography students took part in an urban study in the Haverfordwest area. This investigation feeds into the data collection stage of their fieldwork enquiry, in readiness for their final examination.

Staff INSET is determined by the priorities set out in the School Self Evaluation, School Development Plan and staff requirements as identified via Performance Management. All Inset requests are submitted to CPD/Inset Manager for approval.

12 <u>The Implementation of the Policy for Pupils with Additional Learning</u> Needs.

(It is a Welsh Office requirement that this section is detailed.)

Ysgol Bro Gwaun Additional Needs policy is a whole school policy.

Full copies of the policy are available from the Additional Needs Co-coordinator, (ALNCO), Miss Rhian Lewis, who is the teacher responsible for the day to day operation of the policy.

1) The Success of the A.L.N. Policy,

The school's A.L.N. policy has ensured support for a number of pupils with general and specific difficulties, in a wide range of activities, and at all ability levels. We continue to be delighted this year with the progress into Higher Education of a significant number of pupils with additional needs and congratulate former pupils on their achievements. Once again we are pleased by our successes at G.C.S.E. and KS3. 100% of our Year 11 pupils achieved the Level 1 Threshold, 58% of the ALN Register achieved Level 2 Threshold, and, 33% of pupils on the ALN Register gained Level 2 inc.

The school has provided a number of pupils with an alternative pathway to learning. Pupils have taken part in many outdoor initiatives, working closely with the Ocean Lab, Splat, National Park, the Youth Workers and Cynnydd.

Our ALN bases, Harbwr, Enfys, Corlan and Hendre have helped vulnerable students to access education. Pupils accessing Alternative Curriculum have progressed, succeeded, and have reached their full potential.

For pupils whose Additional Needs had been clearly identified via a Statement, our Additional Learning Needs Coordinator met with the parents and primary school teaching staff in a formal review prior to secondary school entry. Information from primary schools about other pupils who have less severe needs enabled us to plan our level of provision for these children. Similarly, information provided by the parents of new pupils at formal and informal meetings with our ALNCo, School Counsellor, School Nurse, School Inclusion Officer, and Deputy Headteacher, allowed us to make the best preparations to receive new pupils.

Extra Transition visits were put in place for many ALN pupils. Pupils have been tracked, and identified early, to enable interventions to be put in place.

Our policy involves regular assessment for all pupils in school at every stage in their education. Assessment tools differentiated to the needs of individuals and groups are becoming the norm in all areas of the curriculum.

Access arrangements are provided for pupils with specific difficulties during both internal and external assessments, by formal testing. These may take the form of extra time, a less formal setting, a member of staff to act as a reader or word processing facilities, depending on their needs.

Our 'Harbwr' Learning Resource Centre Unit provides a differentiated curriculum for our most complex needs pupils. This has been identified as 'good practice' by the Local Authority and ERW. Pupils access mainstream lessons for experience purposes. The County's Panel places the pupils in Harbwr, due to their severe needs.

The 'Enfys' class operates within the department, which enables a small group of pupils to benefit from specialized support. Along side this, support is offered within maintstream classes by a combination of Support Teaching Staff and Learning Support Assistants. As pupils progress to Year 9 and beyond, support tends to be within mainstream sets with very little withdrawal, except for pupils following individual programmes of study.

Pupils in Years 7 to 11, who are exempt from one or more languages, followed an individual programme of curriculum enrichment. At KS4, we try to give further subject choices to these pupils to maintain a broad balanced curriculum, in addition to their specific programmes. Some pupils follow an alternative curriculum at KS4 and groups of pupils take advantage of the facilities offered by our Youth Worker and Alternative Curriculum Tutor, and cynnydd provisions.

The A.L.N. Department operates a monitoring and record keeping policy as described in the Department for Education "Code of Practice". A pupil's Additional Needs are classified according to a 3-stage process: **Action (A), Action Plus (P)** and **Statement (S)**.

- A Action means help within the class by teachers, a plan is in place.
- **P Action Plus** involves external advice and input to the young person's plan. **S -Statement** a detailed plan provided by the Local Education Authority (a legal document) which states what the pupil's additional needs are and instructs us on how to meet them.

Pupils with Statements have yearly reviews in January, with a "Transition Plan" at age 14 focused on careers and the transition to further education or work. A specialist careers advisor now writes individual career plans for these pupils. All agencies working with the pupils, together with parents or guardians and the pupils are invited to attend the review. New targets are discussed and agreed for the following year. New Individual Development Plans (IDPs), with 'SMART' targets are in place on the newly acquired provision maps.

Consultation -

Extensive use has been made of a number of agencies, such as the Educational Psychology Service, Speech and Language Therapy, Advisory Teachers for Hearing and Visual Impairment and Autistic Spectrum Disorder, CAMHS, Careers Wales, Action for Children and TAF. TAPPAS and SASPs meetings are held every term with the county.

We gratefully acknowledge the support work of internal agencies, and work closely with the pastoral lead, inclusion officer, the school nurse, school counsellor, Corlan, Hendre, and 'BGRU' provision. We also work with other LRCs and Nevland PLC.

We are grateful for the support of organizations which have enabled pupils to take part in other activities such as Disability Sports competitions. Similarly, we thank the local businesses who provide work experience for KS3/4 pupils.

During the last year, our work in behaviour modification has continued, and can be seen to have had an impact on pupils with significant difficulties. During the year the department has worked extensively to support procedures such as Action Planning and Pastoral Support Programmes for young people with behavioural and/or

emotional difficulties.

We also support mainstream teaching staff in offering advice and guidelines on how to support various pupils and how to meet their needs in a mainstream environment.

Finally, we are in constant discussions with parents, and the ALNCo holds regular informed coffee mornings and meetings with parents/guardians to discuss and provide practical support.

3) Resources.

The school's delegated budget provided the resources for the education of pupils with Additional Needs.

Pupils with Disabilities

Ysgol Bro Gwaun has an open entry policy. We are a community school and welcome all pupils from the catchment area, who wish to study and develop personally here. We seek to ensure that all pupils have an equal opportunity to access both a balanced curriculum and all school facilities. The Disability Equality Plan and Access Plans are both in place.

Our successful provision ensures inclusion for all pupils at all levels and ages, making it a truly comprehensive school where all pupils are welcomed, valued, cared, and provided for.

Information about new statutory guidance relating to Governing Body meetings with parents

Parents now have the right to request up to three meetings per year with the governing body to discuss issues which concern them. The purpose must be to discuss issues with relate to the school. It cannot be about individual pupil progress, or to air grievances against members of staff or the governing body.
